COAST GUARD ACCEPTS 2016 ART COLLECTION

Works now on view at Federal Hall following Salmagundi Club show

Twenty-six works by 24 artists were accepted into the Coast Guard Art Program's (COGAP) permanent collection during the annual acceptance ceremony and opening reception July 5 at the Salmagundi Club in New York City. Admiral Charles Michel, vice commandant of the Coast Guard, accepted the new works on behalf of the service.

Robert C. Semler of Bradenton, Fla., was the recipient of the George Gray Award for outstanding artistic achievement. His painting, "Guardians of the Sea," shows service members executing a rescue at sea.

The 2016 collection vividly portrays the service in action: from rigorous training exercises and daring search and rescue cases to drug interdictions in the Western Hemisphere and Fleet Week in New York City.

On behalf of the Coast Guard, Admiral Michel said, "I am truly honored to accept these artworks into the collection. They are striking contributions to our visual narration." He noted that in addition to being an invaluable educational tool, "art is on view throughout the Coast Guard where service members—from the highest leadership to the most newly enlisted—see what they do everyday immortalized and recorded for history."

said the Coast Guard Art Program was "deeply indebted to its member artists who provide the Coast Guard with outstanding art." He noted the opening reception was a way to "publicly acknowledge" these "lasting contributions to the Coast Guard and the country." He was joined by Emcee Capt. Sean Carroll, Coast Guard Chief of External Outreach and Heritage, who added, "We honor the 24 artists' whose works so stunningly depict our myriad missions."

COGAP committee chair and artist recounted a COGAP show in which a particular painting captured a young viewer's attention. She asked those attending the opening to choose for themselves the work that would leave a lasting impression. She noted: "Each painting is an original work of art, well researched by the artist for a faithful depiction, not a piece of fiction or from imagination. We are showing you the work of the Coast Guard. This is what they do. It is reality infused with courage. This IS a one-of-a-kind show!"

The New York Council of the Navy League hosted the reception, a kindness it has repeatedly performed over the years. Among Council members attending were Council President Ted Mason, former president retired Rear Adm. Bob Lunney and Tom Williams, executive secretary. Mason said the Council welcomed hosting the opening reception. Depending upon the work, he stated that each offers the potential to "educate, communicate, inspire, and record, the memorable, often heroic, accomplishments of the men and women of the U.S.'s oldest sea service."

The 2016 collection is now on view at Federal Hall National Memorial through Sept. 7, 2016. The memorial is located just across from the New York Stock Exchange and draws a very large audience. It is on the site where Alexander Hamilton had an office when he was Secretary of the Treasury. The Revenue Cutter Service, created under his leadership, is considered the forerunner of today's Coast Guard.

Robert C. Sermler Wins 2016 George Gray Award

When asked how long it took Robert Semler to complete his award-winning painting "Guardians of the Sea," he says his stock answer is "74 years plus six weeks." In all seriousness, the painting may not have actually taken his entire life span to complete, but his 50-some-odd years of artistry certainly speaks for itself as this is Semler's fourth George Gray Award for Artistic Excellence. "Anytime I win is a thrill," said Semler. "All of the awards make a difference – they all mean something – and this time I was shocked; tickled pink."

Semler's interest in maritime started early. He grew up in New Jersey where his father worked for New York shipbuilding, and his inlaws were Navy and Merchant Marine. "I grew up in a maritime environment, and it's always fascinated me," he said. "I have some salt water in my veins."

His Coast Guard artwork often gets painted by photos he's taken during his time in New Jersey. "Guardians of the Sea" was painted from a photo he took while spending time at Coast Guard Station Cape May when an air station was located there in the late 90s.

Nowadays, Semler can be found in Florida where his artwork is often viewable at a local gallery or on his website. The Coast Guard Art Program, home to nearly 2,000 works of art also houses about 15 of Semler's paintings. "There was a lot of nice artwork in the catalogue this year," he said of his competition. "This was a surprise and I'm thrilled the Coast Guard is happy with my work."
