### **COAST GUARD ACCEPTS 2022 ART COLLECTION**

Thirty-eight works by 27 artists were accepted into the Coast Guard Art Program's (COGAP) permanent collection during the annual acceptance ceremony July 7 at the Salmagundi Club in New York City. Rear Adm. Megan Dean, Coast Guard director of governmental and public affairs, accepted the new works on behalf of the service. Capt. Zeita Merchant, commanding officer of Coast Guard Sector New York, served as the evening's master of ceremonies.

Debra Keirce of Broadlands,


Va., was the recipient of the George Gray Award for Artistic Excellence. Her oil painting "Debris cleanup in Hawaii" shows a Coast Guard service member removing fishnets and debris that cause damage to the ecosystem and marine life and pose safety hazards to ships.

.....This best-in-show work, an exceptional piece among the many outstanding works in the 2022 collection, also heralds the Service's underreported work in remediating damage to marine life. As well it

reflects Keirce's devotion to 17th century art and classical realism.

The 2022 collection vividly portrays the myriad missions of the Coast Guard. Among these are the many training exercises that make the Coast Guard *Semper Paratus*—always ready, illegal drug interdiction, environmental and marine life protection, aids to navigation, working dogs of the Service and daring search and rescue missions including ones of stranded canines.

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The art was on display at the Salmagundi Club from July 5 through July 15, 2022.

Rear Adm. Megan Dean accepted the new works on behalf of the Coast Guard and expressed her profound thanks to COGAP artists and the program's many supporters including the Navy League, the Salmagundi Club and the Coast Guard itself. She noted that 2022 marked the 41th anniversary of COGAP. "Since the program's inception," she said, "artists in their stunning works of art have volunteered their time and talent to capture the vital contributions the U.S. Coast Guard makes to our nation."

She also paid homage to the invaluable contributions of deceased COGAP artists John Deckert, Dr. Myron IMike) Mazer and Sharon Way-Howard who passed away earlier. Deckert's son and Way-Howard's husband and son were in attendance. Several works by these revered artists were on view. Rear Adm. Dean also noted the passing of Chris Nunnally, Salmagundi Club's director of operations and retired Rear Adm. Robert Lunney, a leader of the New York Council of the Navy League. Both were esteemed supporters of the Coast Guard and COGAP.

The admiral was joined in praise of COGAP and its artists by Salmagundi Club Chairman of the Board Nick Dawes and emcee Capt. Zeita Merchant. The captain noted that Coast Guard art was on display at Sector New York and often exhibited for special events.

President of the New York Council of the Navy League Capt. Frank Russo, U.S. Navy (ret.) added his thanks to COGAP's talented corps of artists and underscored Navy League support of the program and the Coast Guard. The council hosted this year's reception, an event it has generously sponsored over the years.

Karen Loew, Salmagundi Club COGAP committee chair and member artist, advised those attending to take a close look at the art. She pointed out that it "embraces the essence of the Coast Guard which is that of service to our country and those who live here."

## Honor, Respect, Devotion to Duty: Debra Keirce Wins 2022George Gray Award for "Debris cleanup in Hawaii"

Debra Keirce had two passions: science and art. The Detroit born artist, winner of this year's George Gray Award, received her bachelor's degree in biochemical engineering from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. But while working as a scientist in New England in the 1980s, she also was painting fine art. In 2010, she turned her passion for the visual arts into a full time career.

Today, she paints from her Northern Virginia studio. Her work involves three themes: traditional renditions of still life, land-scape and portraiture; vintage and surreal work embracing aging, broken people and oddities; and vistas of America in its land and people.

Upon learning that she had received the George Gray Award, the artist noted she was honored to be chosen "because there are so many worthy pieces in this year's collection."

"My work really speaks to our concerns about the planet and environmental issues," Keirce added. "The art depicts the dangerous and unsung work of the Coast Guard removing tons of debris from the reefs around the Hawaiian Islands."

This year's jury for the award—COGAP's highest honor—was comprised of Coast Guard Rear Adm. Megan Dean, and artists Robert Pillsbury, a president emeritus of the Salmagundi Club; and Antonio Masi, president of the American Watercolor Society.

"This work tells the story of our efforts at conservation and helping mitigate climate change," said Rear Adm. Dean. "Once hauled to shore, these nets are recycled into electricity. Protecting our reefs and the ocean is a vital mission for the Coast Guard, but many people are unaware of this important work and this

art will help better tell our story to all those who see it."

Keirce's work is held in private, museum and corporate collections across the globe, including the U.S., Japan, Belize, France, and England. She holds signature memberships in over a dozen major artistic societies. Largely selftaught, the artist is both an author and the subject of numerous publications.

Keirce has been a COGAP member since 2021. During that brief period, five works of her art have been accepted into the permanent collection.

She plans to continue using her extraordinary talent to depict many other vital missions of the Service and some that may also be little known. "Through my work." she said, "I hope to aid in enlightening the public on the many contributions of this great Service."
