COAST GUARD ACCEPTS 2024 ART COLLECTION; RADM PLATT AND CAPT ANDRECHIK PRESIDE

Thirty-six works by 31 artists were accepted into the Coast Guard Art Program's (COGAP) permanent collection during the annual acceptance ceremony July 11, 2024 at the Salmagundi Club in New York City. First Coast Guard District Commander Rear Adm. Michael Platt accepted the new works on behalf of the service. Capt. Jon Andrechik, Commanding Officer of Sector New York, served as the

evening's master of ceremonies. Ken Stetz of Collegeville, Pa., was the recipient of the George Gray Award for Artistic Excellence. His oil painting "Absorbing the roll" shows Coast Guard crew members aboard a cutter as they train to rescue a disabled vessel in waters off the East Coast.

This best-in-show work was lauded by Rear Adm. Platt for capturing the mission's complex-

ity and highlighting the resolve of Coast Guard service members.

The 2024 collection vividly portrays the many missions of the Coast Guard. Among these are the training exercises that make the Coast Guard Semper Paratus—always ready—homeland security, protection of the marine environment and living marine rescues, aids to navigation, working dogs of the

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service as well as search and rescue cases and rescue missions such as depicted in Mr. Stetz's painting.

Rear Adm. Platt, in accepting the new works on behalf of the Coast Guard, expressed profound thanks to COGAP artists and the program's many supporters including the Navy League and the Salmagundi Club. He noted that 2024 marked the 43rd anniversary of COGAP. "Since the program's inception," he said, "artists in their stunning works of art have volunteered their time and talent to capture the vital contributions the U.S. Coast Guard makes to our nation." He also said that as a child, his dream was to become an artist but that a career with the Coast Guard prevailed.

Rear Adm. Platt paid homage to the invaluable contributions of deceased COGAP artists C.R. "Bob" Bryant and Dick Kramer, who passed away earlier. Several works by these two artists were on view.

Newly elected Salmagundi Club Chairman of the Board Ray Cisneros and Capt. Andrechik joined in praise of the service's art program artists. They both lauded the 31 new works in the 2024 collection and remarked that these added significantly to the visual narration of the Coast Guard's story.

Recently elected President of the New York Council of the Navy League James Spear added his thanks to the artists. Mr. Spear noted French artist Edgar Degas who said "Art is not what you see, but what you make others see," in speaking about works in this year's collection. He emphasized Navy League support of the art program and the Coast Guard. The council hosted this year's reception, an event it has repeatedly sponsored.

Karen Loew, Salmagundi Club COGAP Committee Chair and COGAP artist, in her remarks noted: "It's a common phrase – a picture is worth a 1000 words...with enough images here to make a book. The "authors" of this book are the COGAP artists and our "characters" are the men and women of our Coast Guard."

Honor, Respect, Devotion to Duty: Ken Stetz wins 2024 George Gray Award for his oil painting "Absorbing the roll"

Each year jurors select a recipient for the George Gray Award for Artistic Excellence from the collection of artwork submitted to the U.S. Coast Guard Art Program. Ken Stetz is this year's award winner for his artwork "Absorbing the roll." His oil painting shows Coast Guard crewmembers aboard a cutter as they train to rescue a disabled vessel in waters off the East Coast.

The award-winning work was chosen by a panel of judges comprised of Rear Adm. Michael Platt, First Coast Guard District Commander; Stephen Bluto, artist and the Metropolitan Museum of Art's senior collections manager of Arms and Armor; and Richard Rosenblatt, artist and former Salmagundi Club Art Committee Chair.

In talking about Stetz's award winning

work, Rear Adm. Platt said, "I am incredibly excited to be part of the jury for this year's Coast Guard Art Program George Gray Award. A rescue—whether of persons or vessels—can be a complex and dangerous mission for our service. This work captures the action and the reality of a rescue and its artistic execution is both outstanding and compelling."

The New Jersey born artist has had a lifelong interest in art. After graduating from the Harry Lundeberg School of Seamanship and working aboard a U.S. flag

container ship, he pursued a career in art. He studied pictorial illustration, receiving a degree at the Spectrum Institute for the Advertising Arts, and oil painting in the studio of noted American artist Frank E. Zuccarelli.

After a highly accomplished career in graphic design and illustration, the artist turned his attention to fine art, drawing and painting marine subjects from the New Jersey Shore and other coastal areas.

His paintings have won awards in juried shows including best painting in watercolor. His work was also chosen for publication in a noted book on art. The artist is a signature member of the American Society of Marine Artists and has exhibited his work in its national exhibitions. He is also an art instructor and conducts demonstrations and workshops. .

Upon learning that he had won the prestigious George Gray Award, Mr. Stetz remarked: "I am honored to receive such a distinguished award and am proud of my association with the U.S. Coast Guard through COGAP."
